### Fundraising


Rent and Services:

- Abingdon Town Council covers the rent and services which is valued at £7000 pa. Projects funded:
- We were successful in extending the work with **young people**. Christ's Hospital of Abingdon has kindly granted us £11338 to do the important work of youth engagement, effectively 2 days a week paid for 12 months.
- We received £5K for **coordination and delivery of projects** up to end March 2024 from Abingdon Town council with a further 10K for projects for 24/25.
- Lush £5K for activities and working with **young people**.
- Truck £500 for ecokids and youth activities.
- Connected Communities Fund £5K to deliver 26 basic **sewing** classes.


• Food and Warmth Grant - £2364 for equipment and delivery of 6 **cooking** classes by referral only. This will enable more skills sharing opportunities in the future as we now have the equipment.

One Planet Abingdon is active on Facebook, Instagram (2 accounts: 1 general and 1 youth) and Twitter.



### Diversity (race, culture, origin, age)

This is a sensitive area and by sharing this information we hope to improve accessibility and inclusivity to all the people of Abingdon by stating that everyone is welcome.

Age - Youngest supporters actively involved is 9 and oldest is 92 years old.

Gender and sexuality - we have the support of the LGBTQ+ community, and we are doing what we can to support these groups too!

We have continued our engagement with social prescribers in order to offer a service to patients with mental health and association challenges. The basic cooking classes have helped to reach out to these communities.

We are excited that we have volunteers from all over the world who are living in Abingdon and have committed themselves to supporting One Planet - many of them as families rather than individuals - Polish, Chinese, Syrian, Indian, French, to mention a few. We have also begun a conversation with Host Abingdon to facilitate volunteering by those Ukrainian refugees who are now ready to give back to our community - a symbiotic relationship is evolving, and we are very happy about this development.

We are also excited by the progress that we are having reaching out to faith groups in Abingdon and it is only a matter of time before we see the fruits of this work.

We continue to sell nothing - it is all by donation to ensure that we are accessible to everyone. It is important to us that everyone feels welcome in the space, and we are encouraged with the feedback we receive as to how welcomed everyone feels including

those who have had difficult lives, have support workers, and are on the margins of society.

Climate Justice - Empowering Voices Writing Workshop and Fast Fashion Exhibition

The idea to hold an interactive exhibition originated from the

"Empowering Voices" workshop led by OPACEC volunteer and actor, Khairika Sinani who created a transformative journey delving into the art of creative writing and performance, with a strong focus on climate and environmental justice themes.



The Empowering Voices Writing workshop culminated in a special launch of the exhibition 'Fashion Footprint Stories from the wardrobe' in the historic Abbey Buildings, before relocating to the

beautiful rooms of the Council Chamber for the duration of the exhibition. The delivery of an interactive exhibition with dressed mannequins, film screening and information was a big commitment for us, but we felt it was successful in



getting the message across that fast fashion is inter-connected to climate change and climate justice. The free exhibition was well attended and ran for 11 days with 100s attending on the final day of the showing.



'Very good and thought provoking. We all need to know about how our spending on clothes affects the world around us and buy more sustainably, second hand, wherever possible and yes, repair and re-purpose our clothes too. The film is very good - a hard watch but good.' 'Everyone should see it!'

We are grateful to Dionne Freeman, Oxford Makespace, who has enabled a mobile version of the exhibition

to travel so as to continue to raise awareness and inspire action. It is currently being exhibited at the Community Works in Oxford -Lula's restaurant. The exhibition will then move on to

Didcot and Abingdon.

#### CONNECTED COMMUNITIES FUND

#### **Basic Sewing Skills**

The Basic Sewing Skills sessions we knew would be a winner - we didn't realise how much of a winner it would be though!

The funding is for 26 sessions and to date we have delivered 10. The first round was held at Bridge House Care Home which was successful insofar as bringing the communities closer together - and we look forward to collaborating with them again soon (Bespoke Pre-Loved clothing event in April).

The second round of sessions is currently being held at the Makespace Studio in The Charter. These are evening sessions as the feedback we got on Facebook was for evenings. The block of 6 sessions were 'sold out' within

days - proving that this is a workshop that many people are feeling the need for.





We have been encouraged with the diversity of the participants and the feedback we have received is that individuals are feeling more connected and are enjoying the format of the sessions.

We are very grateful to OCVA and OCC for the funding and hope to offer these for young people too should we be successful in finding more funds as these are for adults only.

## Community Cooking Coalition -Basic Cooking skills with the Food and Warmth Grant

We were very excited to be a part of the Community Cooking Coalition offering basic cooking skills sessions to those with support workers who could refer in.

The funding received was for the purchase of kitchen equipment and 6 sessions (2 rounds of 3 sessions).



These have been fun to deliver and it has been heartwarming to get to know the participants who have



gained so much more from the sessions than learning how to cook healthy, vegan meals. Feedback has included feeling part of a community, gaining confidence, feeling less isolated, learning about vegan food and realising that it is delicious, understanding that vegetables are not just good for us but versatile too!

We hope to find more funding to continue this valuable work. The learning and collaborative experience has been fantastic.

### Youth Empowerment

50+ Young people engaged in planning eco events, volunteering their skills, completing DoE awards, doing Work experience, being youth ambassadors for One Planet Abingdon. Success measured by the journey. Real success is if the youth continue to engage after their projects are complete.

A message from one of our Youth Ambassadors:

'Hi, my name is Lena, I started volunteering at OPA for my Bronze Duke of Edinburgh, but even though 3 months have passed I have decided to continue helping out because I enjoy it so much. My original idea was to start craft sessions for older children (and that did happen) but as well as this I helped behind the counter, I baked cakes for people and completed some projects that Michelle had given me to do. (a) My work has inspired many others and has involved my whole family. Among other things, this experience has enabled other things for me, e.g. I am going on a scholarship to Germany to learn more about the language and culture and later will have to organise projects similar to the ones at OPA. The volunteers there are really lovely and it is quite nice to have a chat with them, maybe learn something new 🗐. I have really enjoyed helping out with OPA and hope that many other



people will follow in my footsteps and do their part to help save the planet and in doing so, be a good citizen of our community.'



















### Maen's story

Maen left his hometown, Aleppo in Syria, at the start of 2012 when the revolution turned into an armed conflict and the country became unliveable. After marrying his wife, Manar, he left everything behind, including his home, people, and memories, in search of safety for himself and his family. He arrived in Lebanon and considered getting a visa for a more stable country, as Lebanon was not safe.

Maen was unable to get a visa for Saudi Arabia, where his wife had a family visa due to her parent's



previous employment as dentists. He started looking for jobs to support his family, starting with teaching Arabic to non-Arabic speakers. He eventually found work in the humanitarian sector and was offered a position with the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) to provide education activities and non-formal education to Syrian refugee children.

Due to increasing restrictions on Syrian refugees and those working in the humanitarian sector in 2015, Maen became concerned about being deported to Syria and endangering his family's lives. He moved to Turkey, where he continued working in the humanitarian sector, developing professionally and personally. He found a better job at Rielf International and then joined the German Corporate for International Cooperation (GIZ). He worked there for three years, developing his skills and getting promotion while continuing to support Syrian refugee children in Turkey.

With additional restrictions on Syrian refugees and work permits, Maen realised that Turkey was not a long-term solution. He started looking for opportunities to develop his skills and qualifications to obtain international opportunities in the relief sector. He won a prestigious scholarship, Chevening, in 2019, funded by the FCDO, which allowed him to travel to the UK and study an MA in Education (Leadership and Management). Due to financial constraints, Maen had to spend three years away from his family. In October 2022, Maen was finally reunited with his family (Manar, Lara, and Ali) and moved to Abingdon to start a new life.

Maen believes in contributing to the community and supporting global causes. He found a family-friendly and welcoming place, One Planet Abingdon Climate Emergency Centre, where he and his family can spend quality time together. Maen believes that the organisation's mission aligns with his values and how he can contribute to his community. Currently, Maen and his daughter, Lara are both volunteering with One Planet.

As Ramadan began, Maen and his family shared food with their friends, family, and community, as the month is about sharing love. Maen hopes that he and his family can

contribute to the community and represent their culture and background as active members.

It is with gratitude that we share Maen's experiences with you all.
