Abingdon Town Council wants to make sure every resident knows where to access support during the ongoing Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

Not everyone has family or friends living nearby and if for any reason you find yourself struggling during this time, there are a number of local organisations, charities and groups that are ready, willing and able to give you the support you need.

Vale of White Horse Community Hub is standing ready to support you, including with

food and prescription deliveries. They'll be able to put you in touch with other community and



volunteer groups or services (some of which are listed here).

Abingdon Coronavirus Community Response

was established in the spring to help the residents of Abingdon support each other throughout the pandemic. Having completed over 3,000 errands including help with shopping, collection of prescriptions and friendly chats, they are ready to serve the town again over the winter months.

AbiMeds provides a phone advice service for those needing help arranging prescription deliveries from local pharmacies.

AbiMeds also offers a limited prescription delivery service on Fridays but this will only be available to those in the government's Clinically Extremely Vulnerable category if they have been unable to set up prescription delivery with their pharmacy.




The Abingdon Community Fridge is currently located at the Health and Wellbeing Centre on Crabtree Place, OX143GD.



Neighbourhood Plan update

Update on the Neighbourhood Plan

The project was officially launched at the Annual Town Meeting in March 2020, however the nationwide lockdown that followed just a

few weeks later, and the ongoing public health emergency, has made engaging people more difficult than would normally be the case.

However the response to the last Town Crier magazine and social media posts has now brought forward a fantastic range of local voices that the Neighbourhood plan



team are engaging with. This group took part in a briefing meeting with Feria, our Neighbourhood Plan consultants, in mid October and have been involved in carrying out assessments of their local neighbourhood areas.

The results of these assessments will help to form part of the research base for the neighbourhood plan.

At the time of writing, these local assessments are being carried out by individuals and small teams across Abingdon. When these are finished, we will be able to identify any gaps in the assessments and potentially carry out further research work. Following this localised assessment work, representatives of the various town institutions will be invited to get involved. The project team are keen to combine the voices from Abingdon's various local neighbourhoods with those representing the town's established societies, institutions, and larger organisations. Together, this will create a balanced and effective steering group. The project will then move forwards from there.

Street Names in Abingdon

The first phase of the development off Dunmore Road is well under way and the developers and Vale of White Horse District Council recently consulted Abingdon Town Council on some new street names for the development.

Have you ever wondered where the name of your street came from? Was it the surname of a Past Mayor or maybe the name of one of Abingdon's Twin Towns?

We spoke to Abingdon's Honorary Archivist Mrs Jackie Smith who confirmed the main criteria for choosing street names in the past has usually been:



- Historical connections and figures such as Past Mayors
- Connections with Abingdon Abbey
- Important families in Abingdon

If we go back to the 1930's when the town started to expand the prime source of new names reflected important individuals such as past Mayors. This can be seen in names such as 'Boxhill' and 'Barbour'. in South Abingdon we see this again in places such as 'Saxton' and 'Blacknall'. This trend continued into the 1950's with the award-winning estate on the east of Wootton Road including names such as 'Darrell', 'Cheyney' and 'Harcourt'.

The AERE estates for example at Fitzharrys and on the Oxford Road chose names of Abbey estates and manors, such as 'Aston', 'Welford' and 'Lyford'.

Then in the early 1970's new estates were named after poets, for example 'Tennyson Drive', 'Wordsworth Road', and 'Masefield Crescent'.

Even Abingdon's Twin Towns get a look in with 'St Niklaas Close', 'Argentan Close' and 'Lucca Drive.'

It seems that the town's history continues to influence the choice of names as this year's suggestions were also deceased Past Mayors and Freemen of the town.

Spring Road Cemetery

Situated within the Spring Road cemetery is an area set aside for the more eco conscious burial. This area is maintained as a wild flower meadow although it does require some maintenance, namely annual cutting. This is carried out with machinery and then manually raked which is labour intensive and somewhat wasteful.

So instead The Council are looking at acquiring a handful of sheep to graze at the above area in a controlled manner.

A beehive has also been successfully installed in the Spring Road Cemetery as another way of enriching our biodiversity within the cemeteries!

Have you seen the wild area? It's Bee-Ewe-tiful!..
