Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

The country and the world marked the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II after a remarkable reign from 1952 to 2022, the longest of any British monarch. Those 70 years saw dramatic change, one reflected in the recent history of Abingdon, which has seen significant growth in the town, the development of the nearby science centres of excellence at Culham and Harwell and the end of many traditional industries such as the celebrated MG factory.



The Queen visited Abingdon in November 1956, just a few years into her record-breaking reign, when she opened the new museum at the County Hall and met with local dignitaries.



21 April 1926 – 8 September 2022

The announcement of Her Late Majesty's death was marked by a series of national, international and local events. In Abingdon, the Union Flag on the County Hall was lowered to half-mast and a Book of Condolence was opened. The book was signed by a large number of residents and visitors and will offer a fascinating historical record of her reign and her popularity in our community.

Throughout her reign,
Abingdon marked significant
royal events with its traditional
bun throwing, most recently
in June this year when buns
were once again thrown from
the roof of the County Hall
museum to mark her Platinum
Jubilee – a joyous event and
now a poignant memory.





Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

Following the death of Her Majesty the Queen, the accession of our new King, Charles III was proclaimed across the country. Abingdon marked this event on Sunday 11 September 2022 with the official proclamation read by the Mayor, Cllr



Andy Foulsham, accompanied by the MP, Layla Moran and the Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Robert Kirtland, the commanding officer of the 3rd Regiment, Royal Logistics Corps, representatives from Thames Valley Police and past Mayors of Abingdon.




Abingdon Platinum Jubilee

Abingdon Platinum Jubilee

In June, more than 20,000 people celebrated Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's 70-year reign at events organised by the town council.

The Platinum Jubilee Meadow Festival saw over 15,000 people enjoy a range of entertainments, including many of Abingdon's clubs and societies, live music and performances. The town council provided these events for free, given the increased costs of living and financial challenges faced by so many at this time.





A host of clubs and societies attended to showcase their activities and there were entertainments including Punch and Judy, a face painter and a balloon modeller. The event hosted the ATOM! science festival, which was a huge draw for young people.

Community grants from the town council

Radley Lakes

The town council supports a wide range of groups across Abingdon with large and small grants to support a range of projects and activities. Each year, up to £20,000 is awarded by the town council's Community Committee.

Healthy Abingdon was supported to run an event in the Market Place for groups to promote health and wellbeing.



A grant was given to support ATOM Festival events at the Platinum Jubilee and in the Market Place this Summer. The events were as usual very popular.

The town council awarded Radley Lakes Trust a grant towards the cost of an entry hub on Barton Fields for the wider Radley Lakes area and the management of Barton Fields as a nature reserve. See the article on page two. The Friends of Carswell School were awarded a large grant towards the cost of replacing an astroturf pitch which has become dangerous and currently cannot be used by children.

Churches in Abingdon were given help to enable them to give Christmas bags to people in the town who were on their own at Christmas.

Clean Slate has been supported by the town council to provide courses to survivors of abuse. The charity is based in Upper Heyford and has been providing support for 12 years.

Radley Lakes is a 150-hectare area of former gravel quarries close to the River Thames, between Abingdon and Radley, right on the doorstep of thousands of local homes. The area has regenerated naturally and is a local wildlife site.

A wide range of habitats – including, deep lakes, shallow lakes, ponds, marsh and grassland – support a rich variety of natural life. The area is a peaceful haven away from noise and traffic for those who love nature or want to walk or run in beautiful surroundings and it provides opportunities for people to be actively involved in conservation work.

The Radley Lakes Trust is a local charity whose mission is to improve access and protect and enhance natural life. We are guided by a long-term masterplan for the area and we work with a range of stakeholders, including local councils, landowners and community groups.

Projects include an information hub on Barton Fields funded by the Town Council. This includes an interpretation board about the area and benches to sit with an attractive view. An area of wildflower plantings will follow.

A new all-weather path has been created to link the Sustrans cycle track and the Thames path - part of a wider planned network of routes to join the Lakes area together and to link with other trails. The pictures here show the old muddy path and the work to transform it.

Abingdon's local bus service

The number 41 runs each weekday across Abingdon.

Abingdon Town Council provides funding for the number 41 bus service which runs around the town each day. The bus goes from the White Horse Leisure Centre to Caldecott, via Fairacres. Adult tickets cost from £1.80 single to £2.70 return

Neighbourhood Plan

The Abingdon Neighbourhood Plan steering group is consulting on three further topics to improve travel, employment and opportunities for young people and families in Abingdon. Abingdon Carousel Family Centre is based at Caldecott Chase and runs free drop-in play sessions for families with children aged 0-4 on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays 9.30-11am. The centre has a lovely playroom and secure garden for children to play in and our experienced playworkers are on hand to support parents. We welcome all families from across Abingdon and the surrounding area Our team also run the Family Links Nurturing Programme providing parents with the understanding and skills to experience the best of family life.
